It is set to be played on indoor hard courts at the Inalpi Arena in Turin, Italy for the fifth consecutive time, and would be the season-ending event for the highest-ranked singles players and doubles teams on the 2025 ATP Tour. The tournament is due to be the 56th edition of the singles event and the 51st edition of the doubles competition. The ATP Finals group stage has a round-robin format, with eight players/teams divided into two groups of four and each player/team in a group playing the other three in the group. The eight seeds are determined by the PIF ATP rankings and ATP Doubles Team Rankings on the Monday after the last ATP Tour tournament of the calendar year. All singles matches, including the final, are best of three sets with tie-breaks in each set including the third. All doubles matches are two sets (no ad) and a Match Tie-break.[1] In deciding placement within a group, the following criteria are used, in order:[1] Most wins. Most matches played (e.g., a 2–1 record beats a 2–0 record). Head-to-head result between tied players/teams. Highest percentage of sets won. Highest percentage of games won. ATP rank after the last ATP Tour tournament of the year. Criteria 4–6 are used only in the event of a three-way tie; if one of these criteria decided a winner or loser among the three, the remaining two will have been ranked by head-to-head result. The top two of each group will advance to semifinals, with the winner of each group playing the runner-up of the other group. The winners of the semifinals then will play for the title. Eight players compete at the tournament, with two named alternates. Players receive places in the following order of precedence:[2] First, the top 7 players in the ATP Race to Turin after the final week of the ATP Tour on 8 November 2025 Second, up to two 2025 Grand Slam tournament winners ranked anywhere 8th–20th, in ranking order Third, the eighth ranked player in the ATP rankings In the event of this totaling more than 8 players, those lower down in the selection order become the alternates. If further alternates are needed, these players are selected by the ATP. Provisional rankings are published weekly as the ATP Race to Turin, coinciding with the 52-week rolling ATP rankings on the date of selection.[3] Points are accumulated in Grand Slam, ATP Tour, United Cup, ATP Challenger Tour and ITF Tour tournaments. Players accrue points across 19 tournaments, usually made up of:[4] The 4 Grand Slam tournaments The 8 mandatory ATP Masters 1000 tournaments The best results from any 7 other tournaments that carry ranking points (Monte-Carlo Masters, United Cup, ATP 500, ATP 250, Challenger, ITF) Player can replace up to 3 mandatory Masters 1000 results with a better score from ATP 500 or ATP 250 Eight teams compete at the tournament, with one named alternate. The eight competing teams receive places according to the same order of precedence as in singles. The named alternate will be offered first to any unaccepted teams in the selection order, then to the highest ranked unaccepted team, and then to a team selected by the ATP. Points are accumulated in the same competitions as for the singles tournament. However, for Doubles teams there are no commitment tournaments, so teams are ranked according to their 19 highest points scoring results from any tournaments on the ATP Tour.[2] Player is active in Hamburg or Geneva. ATP Finals 2022 Schedule The group matches for the 2022 ATP Finals are played between Sunday, November 13th, and Friday, November 18th. The two groups alternate for each successive day, meaning that if Group A plays on Sunday, Group B will play on Monday. You then have the semi-finals played on Saturday, November 19th, followed by the finals on Sunday, November 20th. After a week of thrilling matches, the last two survivors of the tournament will fight for the title in Turin. Casper Ruud will participate in his third final of the year. The boy lost only one set to Rafael Nadal, but he had already secured first place. Now he has to face another veteran tennis player. Without a doubt, Casper Ruud vs Novak Djokovic will be a thrilling feature. Day 7 ATP Finals Results Novak Djokovic vs Taylor Fritz After this duel, Taylor Fritz was disappointed to be out of the Final of Turin, but at least he fought to the end against Novak Djokovic. In the first set, Fritz broke Djokovic's serve, but the Serbian player immediately recovered it. A tiebreak was necessary to break the tie and define Novak as the winner. In the second set, it was similar, but it was Djokovic who took the lead. Taylor Fritz responded on the next serve and evened the games again. This time the tiebreak was not as close as the previous one, but it had the same winner. Casper Ruud vs Andrey Rublev Andrey Ruble had his worst performance of the championship, in his most important duel. He also met Casper Ruud who is in a great moment and did not hesitate to take advantage of his opponent's mistakes. Everyone expected a more even match, but it turned out to be easy for Casper Ruud who needed just over an hour to win 6-2, 6-4, and go home early to rest and prepare for one of the most important features in his career. A win would certainly be a boost for the ATP rankings updates. It's always a thrilling event to watch, and I for one will be trying to catch the matches. However, while many tennis fans are aware of the tournament, the format and schedule still escape most people. After all, it doesn't work like a traditional tennis tournament. Therefore, I wanted to put together a quick guide on the ATP Finals to let you know how these elements work. Below, I will be discussing the format of the tournament in terms of both the group stages and the knockout part of the event. And I shall also be revealing the provisional schedule for the event in Turin. There is a fair bit of information to run through, so let's get right into it. Breakdown of the ATP Finals 2022 As a quick reminder, the ATP Finals are due to get started this Sunday - November 13th. It is a tournament that consists of the top 8 guys in the world. And the tournament comes to a close on Sunday, November 20th. This is the day when the final is played and we all get to find out who takes the throne for the 2022 season. However, there is plenty of tennis action between these dates, which brings us to the format and schedule of the event. Tournament Format Explained The draw for the ATP Finals 2022 will be made today, and this is when we will know which players are going into which boxes. On that note, the 8 players are split into two groups of 4 players. They then play each of the other three guys in their respective boxes one time. After each of the individual matches has been played, the top two guys from each group will progress to the semi-finals. At the simplest level, the two guys' progress is based on match wins alone. But if there is a tie, it goes down to head-to-head records to see who will go through. The winner of Group A will then play against the runner-up from Group B in the semis. And the winner of Group B will play the runner-up from Group A. Of course, the winners of the semi-finals will then compete against one another in the finals. All matches are played in a best-of-three format, with the third set being a full set with a tie-break at 6-6.
